Aho Concerto for Soprano Saxophone; Quintet

Anders Paulsson (saxophone); Lapland CO/John Storgards *BIS BIS-2216*



Aho's concerto combines dissonance with an elegant Nielsen-like soundworld. The Quintet

disappoints, the performance lacking cohesion. (FP) $\star \star \star$

Albéniz Piano Concerto No. 1 Mignone Piano Concerto

Big-boned and unwieldy, Mignone's Piano Concerto leans a little too heavily on Rachmaninov, but

the sultry Albéniz is worth getting to know. Passionate performances of both. (JP) $\star \star \star \star$

Howells, Messiaen and Eben all inform Bednall's thrilling, richly layered music. Paul Walton does

Susan Bickley and Christopher Gillett gamely eke out every ounce of character from these rarely

performed songs, but even that isn't enough to make them particularly memorable. (JP) $\star \star \star$

Cage Chess Pieces; Four Dances T Johnson Rational Melodies etc

The unusual combination of clarinet, percussion and piano in an arrangement of

a Cage work plus music by the minimalist Tom Johnson is an enveloping listening experience.

Chopin Ballade No. 4 etc

Finghin Collins (piano) Claves 50-1719



Nocturnes, Mazurkas and a Prelude frame the Ballade No. 4 and Polonaise-Fantaisie.

Collins builds tensions subtly with a sense of melodic line. The recorded sound is a tad harsh. (OC) ★★★

Piano Concertos Nos 3, 4 & 5 Simon Callaghan (piano); BBC SSO/ Martyn Brabbins *Hyperion CDA 68173*



Rachmaninov meets Ivor Novello – these suave, sophisticated works are beautifully orchestrated, and

lavished here with playing of unstinting poise. (OC) $\star \star \star \star$

Mahler Symphony No. 4

Genia Kühmeier (soprano); Munich Philharmonic/Valery Gergiev Munchner Philharmoniker MPHIL0005



The Munich Philharmonic gives a nuanced and colourful performance, in

which Gergiev gives the music room to breathe. (FP) $\star\star\star\star$

Motets; Piano Trio No. 2 etc Pekka Kuusisto (violin), Pieter Wispelwey (cello), Alasdair Beatson (piano); Flemish Radio Choir/Hervé Niquet Evil Penguin EPRC 0024



An imaginative programme of chamber and choral music, designed to highlight links

between them, is capped by a superb Second Piano Trio. (JP) ★★★★

Rachmaninov • Shostakovich Cello Sonatas

Cawo LWC 1131
Cello and piano are equal partners on this disc, and both players find an admirable delicacy.

Compelling interpretations of 20th-century Russian cello classics. (FP) $\star\star\star\star$

Rimsky-Korsakov Romances

A gorgeous feast of Rimsky-Korsakov's neglected Romances, rich in melody and colour. The two

terrific, impassioned young singers are ones to watch. (RF) $\star\star\star\star$

Saint-Saëns Suite for piano in F etc Mario Patuzzi (piano) *Dynamic CDS7796*



Playing a 1923 Pleyel for this disc of rarities, Patuzzi occasionally lacks a lightness of

touch, but these are largely lively performances. (FP) $\star\star\star$

Saint-Saëns · Offenbach

Works for cello and orchestra Camille Thomas (cello); Orchestre National de Lille/Alexander Bloch DG 4797520



Forget the Saint-Saëns concerto – it's not the finest performance. Delve instead into the

rarities here, including the same composer's Suite. (OC) ★★★

Shostakovich

Chamber Symphony in C minor Strauss Metamorphosen

Baltic Chamber Orchestra/Emmanuel Leducq-Barôme $Rubicon\,RCD1009$



Played here with sensitivity and intent these elegiac works have a haunting quality. The recorded

sound is slightly foggy. (FP) $\star \star \star$

Symphony No. 4; Violin Concerto Sergey Levitin (violin); Royal Scottish National Orchestra/Martin Yates Dutton CDLX 7341



Inspired by the opening of a new railway, the filmic 'Turksib' Symphony bears the marks of

the Stalinist era in which it was written. It's an enjoyable listen nonetheless, as is the autumnal Violin Concerto. (JP) ★★★

Virtaperko Romer's Gap;

Multikolor; Ambrosian Delights Perttu Kivilaakso (amplified cello) et al; Jyväskylä Sinfonia/Ville Matvejeff Ondine ODE 1305-2



Amplified cello and orchestra sounds iffy on paper, but in practice there's something rather

striking about this rock-meetsclassical concerto. (RF) ★★★

A glorious treat of a disc, with the mellifluous, intertwining voices of countertenors

Filippo Mineccia and Raffael Pe transporting us to magical realms. Baroque duets at their finest. (RF) ****

Alistair McGowan – The Piano Album Satie, Grieg, Bach et al

Given that McGowan is just beginning to learn the piano, the pieces here are all pretty simple. He

plays them, though, with admirable sensitivity and grace. (JP) ★★★

With a mix of traditional songs and contemporary works, this disc explores the varied potential of

the recorder. The ensemble creates a controlled sound and clean tone. Lots of fun. (FP) ★★★★

Bohemian Rhapsody

Neruda, Dittersdorf et al Gábor Boldoczki (trumpet); PKF – Prague Phil Sony Classical 88985443362



In a programme of Czech rarities and arrangements, Boldoczki proves himself the real deal,

fleet of tongue with a tone in turns silvery and velvety. (OC) $\star \star \star$
